

"A brownfield is a real property, the expansion, redevelopment, or reuse of which may be complicated by the presence or potential presence of a hazardous substance, pollutant, or contaminant" (EPA).

WHAT ARE BROWNFIELDS?

- An inactive property that is partially to completely abandoned/underutilized and has a history of usage likely to indicate presence or potential presence of contamination
- Abandoned gas stations, dry cleaners, mills, warehouses, and vacant lots

BROWNFIELDS IN NEW ENGLAND

- Over 3000 formally identified Brownfields & many remain unlisted

BROWNFIELD REDEVELOPMENT PROCESS

- Community Engagement Early & Often throughout all steps of redevelopment
- Due Diligence Phase I prior to acquisition of site
- Assessment Determine the extent of contamination
- Cleanup Develop a remedial action plan to meet the state-based standards for human & environmental health
- Redevelopment Conduct a market analysis and find a developer to carry out reuse plan
